### 1. Begin narrowing things down:

- Continue adding to your list of activities and awards received in high school.
  - Narrow your list of college choices and majors.
  - Continue researching scholarships and financial aid.
- You will take the PSAT in October for the last time. Taking the PSAT as a junior will determine eligibility and qualification for the National Merit Scholarship Program. PSAT question analysis will occur again.

### 2. Gather information and take action:

- Continue looking over GAfutures, CollegeBoard, and ACT websites, and utilize resources found on these websites for the SAT and ACT.
- Inquire about SAT and ACT dates, and create a calendar to keep up with these dates.
- Take at least two tests this year. It is recommended students take both the SAT and ACT, as students will likely have a preference one over the other.
- When you attend the College Fair at Georgia Southern in the Fall, be sure to speak with the college representatives, ask questions, and look over the materials they provide.
  - Continue browsing scholarship websites.

### 3. Meet with your school counselor:

- Schedule and take part in college visitations.
  - Ask about college open house dates.
- Discuss the NCAA, NAIA clearinghouses if you are considering college athletics.
  - Ask if you have questions about college and career options.
